CAT ARTHRITIS*


Cats do not stay kittens forever. It is normal for their behaviours to change with adulthood.

However, an adult cat becoming less agile and playing less is often disregarded as "just getting older," when the changes may actually be due to other reasons.2,3

*Osteoarthritis (OA) or degenerative joint disease (DJD).

The good news is that you can help your cat and veterinarian by watching out for possible signs of arthritis pain at home, such as changes in your cat's movement and behaviour.

Please take a few minutes to see how your cat compares to the changes in cat-like moves shown in the examples on the following pages—especially if you are the owner of a middle to older-age cat.

DOES YOUR CAT SHOW POSSIBLE SIGNS OF ARTHRITIS PAIN?

Just like humans, cats differ in personalities and behaviours. It is **change** in **your cat's** movement or behaviours that is most indicative of pain associated with arthritis. Even then, there can be other reasons for those changes. Consult with your veterinarian. Only a qualified veterinarian can properly assess your cat and make an accurate diagnosis of arthritis.

Cat arthritis is a lifelong condition, but a lot can be done to help. By acting now, you can help your cat feel more comfortable and give them the potential to rediscover some of their cat-like

Your veterinarian may choose to treat your cat's chronic pain with medication like a non-steroidal anti-inflammatory drug (NSAID).

It's an important part of a cat's life





A CAT'S LIFE



One thing is for certain, cats like to rest. In fact, they like to rest a lot!

But whether they are indoors or outdoors,

movement —

is important for many things:



Life's necessities





Has your cat changed its cat-like moves?

Each drawing and description is an example of a possible change in movement or behaviour.^{2,6} Look at each example in turn.

Think back to when **your cat** was a young adult (but not a kitten) and compare his/her movement and behaviours **then** to **now**.

Do you see any similarities to the examples provided?

If the answer is "yes," please tick the box.

Cats are individuals, so if your cat has never expressed a certain behaviour, simply move on to the next example.



PLAYING

Plays energetically and with interest

Little to no interest in toys or chasing objects



KEY: ■ Previous behaviour i.e. "young, adult cat" ■ Changed behaviour i.e. "cat as he/she is now"

HYGIENE: APPEARANCE

Good thorough self-grooming: smooth shiny coat

Poor self-grooming: coat is dull and may be matted in places



HYGIENE: GROOMING POSTURE

Flexible posture, extensive grooming

Inflexible posture: Grooms easy to reach areas only



JUMPING DOWN

Jumps down without hesitation in one graceful leap

Hesitates or lowers body down before jumping. Uses other objects as steps



JUMPING UP

Leaps straight up to higher levels without hesitation

Uses other objects as steps or avoids high-level areas



HYGIENE: GROOMING ACTIVITY

Relaxed grooming of feet, legs, back and other areas

Overzealous grooming. May cause loss of fur or sore skin



HYGIENE: TOILETING

Clean and tidy. No problem getting into tray. Comfortable posture

Struggles to climb into tray. Awkward posture. Accidents/ missed target



STAIR CLIMBING

Moves quickly and smoothly up stairs without hesitation

Hesitates or avoids stairs. Moves slowly or awkwardly. Might stop midway



STAIR DESCENDING

Moves quickly and smoothly down stairs without hesitation

Hesitates or avoids stairs. Moves slowly or awkwardly. Might stop midway



SOCIABILITY

Sociable and enjoys company, does not shy away from contact, does not avoid people

Sits in areas away from the family, may hide under furniture



PERSONALITY

Calm and non-aggressive, can be stroked without reaction

Avoids contact. Can be aggressive when touched
